

THE PERFECT PRESENT! YOUR CHANCE TO BUY A STATUETTE OF PETER PAN



This charming statuette is a copy of Sir George Frampton's monumental work commissioned by JM Barrie in 1910 and secretly placed in Kensington Gardens on the night of 30 April 1912.

This new work is taken from a very small edition created in 1915 in aid of the Red Cross in the Great War. It has been made available by Joanna Lumley, who launched this new, limited edition statuette exactly 100 years later – to the day.

Only 100 copies will be cast and sold. Each commission will be produced by the Black Isle Bronze foundry in Nairn and the proceeds of all sales will go to support the work of the Peter Pan Moat Brae Trust.

Peter Pan 2012 is a bronze statuette, numbered and marked *Centenary Edition 2012* on the base. It is 22 inches / 54.5 cm high on a bronze base.

The statuette is priced at £10,000 including VAT, packing and delivery to addresses in the UK. Orders will be commissioned individually with payment required in advance.

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THE PETER PAN MOAT BRAE PROJECT IN DUMFRIES

The Peter Pan Moat Brae Trust, of which I am proud to be Patron, was set up in 2009 to save Moat Brae House and garden from demolition. Moat Brae is a Listed Georgian townhouse in South West Scotland, designed by Dumfries architect Walter Newall in 1823, and is acknowledged as being the inspiration for JM Barrie's iconic character Peter Pan.

The memories of the wonderful carefree games of adventure and excitement with his school friends Stuart and Hal Gordon, played in the rambling garden leading down to the river, were indelibly etched on Barrie's memory. Nearly 50 years later, on being awarded the Freedom of Dumfries, he was to say:

"these escapades in a certain Dumfries garden, which is enchanted land to me, were certainly the genesis of that nefarious work – Peter Pan."

Our project plans to restore this enchanted land, to recreate a place where today's children can let their imagination run wild, and to reinvent that wonderful garden where they can create their own Neverland and lose themselves in a world of fantasy and make-believe.

By responding to Barrie's original inspiration whilst at school at nearby Dumfries Academy, we propose that Moat Brae should become a national Centre for Children's Literature.

The Trust's fundraising campaign was launched in August 2011. We need £4m to ensure that this exciting regeneration project comes to fruition. Phase A of the restoration project is planned to start in January 2013.

We are at 'Five to Midnight' in saving this wonderful house. By commissioning a Centenary Edition copy of my Peter Pan statue, you will be helping us to realise our vision which is to restore Barrie's 'enchanted land' in such a way as to appeal to the child in us all.
